



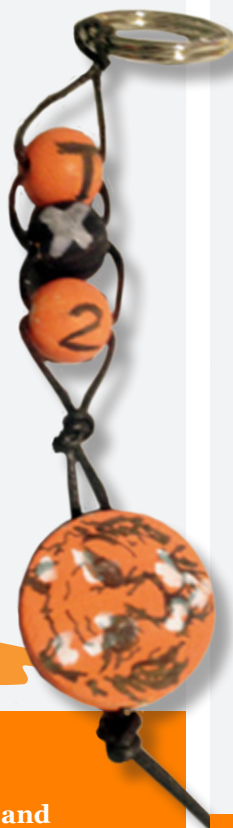
# TIGER KEY RING

The beautiful, awe-inspiring tiger is one of our planet's most iconic animals. But wild tiger numbers dropped by more than 95% since the beginning of the 20th century. Now, for the first time in conservation history, their numbers are on the increase.

## What you need

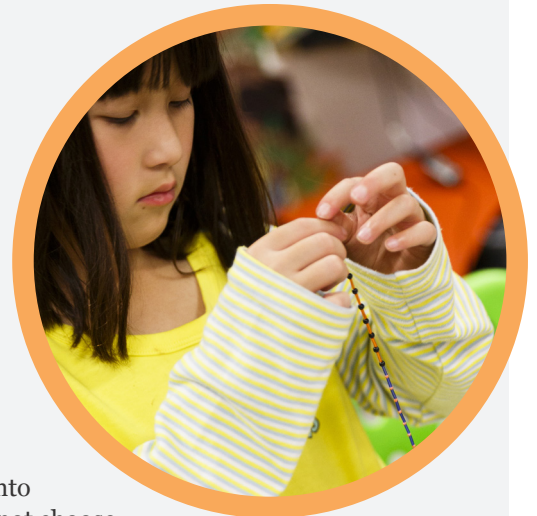
- Beads
- Key ring loop
- Cotton / string
- Pens
- Recycled materials

## What to do

1. Make a knot on the end of the cotton or string
2. Thread beads onto the string; why not choose alternate orange and black beads to make tiger stripes?
3. Decorate wooden beads with tiger stripes or Tx2

## Top tips

Use recycled items to make alternative beads... you could cut shapes from an old plastic bottle, fold paper to make beads or cut small pieces of fabric into rolls to add to your keyring...
